Comment

The number of broodmares served in NSW decreased by 3.67% year on year. However the 2021/22 Season services are still higher than the 2018/19 and 2019/20 Seasons. The drought from 2018 to 2020 caused a noted decrease in the mare pool.

It is evident that Breeders are choosing to breed their mares to NSW Sires more with 53% of services being by NSW Sires. This is a significant increase comparing to the 2017/18 Season where NSW sires only made up 33% of Services. This could be due to more Stallions standing in NSW and also the NSW Breeders Challenge Blue race and bonus series.



Comment

The Western Districts and Riverina have accounted for 64.2% of all foals born in the last five (5) breeding seasons. Their role in the breeding industry in NSW is critical.

However, with the introduction of Benstud NSW the Goulburn and Menangle region has increased in foal numbers, which has been vital to NSW Breeding.

The number of live foals to services has been quite consistent averaging 66.2%.

NSW had been experiencing the drought for the third year in the 19/20 breeding season and as expected resulted in 84 fewer mares served in 2019/20 compared to 2018/19.

The NSW Standardbred Breeding Industry and for that matter the Australasian Standardbred Breeding Industry has been in decline for the past three decades. This continues to be a world-wide problem.

There has been a significant drop in the number of foals born, particularly in the last decade. This has come about due to a number of factors, which are now consistent:

- a) Breeders are predominately in the older quartile with disposable income, they are not being replaced by younger breeders. Natural attrition takes a toll on the number of broodmares bred each season.
- b) The cost of living means that it is difficult for parents with children to afford the costs associated with breeding horses, therefore there are next to nil breeders to replace those that are lost.
- c) There are fewer stud/agistment farms operating to put downward pressure on agistment fees, meaning that the cost of agisting horses becomes more expensive.
- d) The use of stallion and mare mating's in the paddock (by rural participants) has virtually stopped.
- e) There is a genuine feeling that the best sires dominate racing and that if you do not patronise them you cannot compete. Accordingly breeders are either having one mare served as opposed to two or three or they are not breeding at all.
- f) Natural Disasters over the past years including, Drought, Covid-19 and floods.

Despite the above negatives, there is no doubt that the quality of the Standardbred in Australasia has improved dramatically over the past decade with the widespread use of semen transport and artificial insemination. This has allowed breeders to have their mare(s) served by the stallion of their choice regardless of the stallion's physical location.

The effects of the continual decreases in live foals will most likely take five (5) to seven (7) years to be realised in the horse population, however if foal numbers continue to drop then the current number of meetings and races in NSW may not be able to be maintained.

Handicapping system was changed by Harness Racing Australia with the implementation of a National Rating Points System. This system aims to group horses of equal ability at any given time of their careers. A system which provides opportunities for all horses to be competitive and viable is essential given the drop in foal numbers and it is imperative that every sound and capable horse in the system is competing on the race track.

Comment

The percentage of NSW foals as an Alive Foal Population percentage of all Foals born in Australia remains at 30%. NSW and VIC have provided 72% of Alive Foals born in Australia in 2021/22 which has been consistent over the past three seasons.

Foal numbers in all States have increased from the previous season and are the highest foal numbers we have had since 2018/19.

The increase in foals born is an exciting figure for the industry. This could be due to Breeding Schemes offered Australia Wide and also the addition of a Yearling Sale Company. It must also be noted that the drought conditions no longer were in effect. However there was still Floods and Covid-19 impacts.

In the 2020/21 Season 46% of 2YO starters won therefore the Owners would have received the additional True Blue Bonus, which is \$3,000 Cash. Also 54% of 3YO starters won and would have received the True Blue Bonus if they did not receive it as a 2YO.

HRNSW introduced the Stallion Incentive Scheme in 2009/10. It was introduced to encourage owners of highly credentialed stallions to stand them in NSW by offering an advertising subsidy.

The amount of subsidy for each individual Stallion is based on criteria implemented by HRNSW.

To be eligible Pacing Stallions must stand for a minimum of \$2,000 (ex GST) and Trotting Stallions must stand for a minimum of \$1,000 (ex GST).

Comment

Comparing the last five (5) breeding seasons, the 2021/22 season has the highest number of services to Stallion Incentive Scheme eligible stallions with 969 services. This is a positive sign with 71% of all services to NSW Stallions were by Stallion Incentive Scheme eligible stallions.

This spike in services is due to the addition of new stallions, Rocknroll World, Capt Midnight, Ultimate Machete and a number of Trotting Sires.

HRNSW introduced the Colonial Stallion Bonus in the 2014/15 Breeding Season. It was initiated to provide well performed and bred Australasian horses (Colonial Stallions) the opportunity to attract strong books of mares and to provide breeders with an incentive to send their mares to such Stallions.

To be eligible Stallions must meet the below criteria:

- a) In the breeding season of conception the Stallion must have physically and exclusively stood at a HRNSW registered stud located in NSW.
- b) The stallion must have been bred in Australasia.
- c) The stallion must have won a Group 1 race.
- d) The sire of the stallion must have won a Group 1 or equivalent race.
- e) In the breeding season of conception the stallion must have been nominated for the NSW Breeders Challenge.

The inclusion of an eligible stallion commences from the inaugural year physically standing at a HRNSW registered stud in NSW and ceases six (6) years thereafter (For example 2014/15 to 2019/20).

a) If a stallion returns to racing or stands at an interstate Stud, but then returns to Stud in NSW, the Colonial Stallion Bonus rebate will still cease six (6) years after the first season standing at a HRNSW registered stud in NSW.



Comment

Breeder's perception around Colonial Stallions is continuing to evolve. When this scheme was first implemented only 14% of NSW Services were Colonial Stallions. In the 2021/22 Season 56% of NSW domiciled Services are Colonial Stallions. Other factors that have contributed to this rise is the quality and the now larger and diverse range of Colonial Stallions standing in NSW.

There was an Equine Influenza outbreak in 2007, the effects were felt for three (3) seasons.

NSW Breeders Challenge Owners Bonus Certificates increase from \$2,500 to \$3,000

The effects of the NSW drought impacted the foal crops for three (3) seasons.

Comment

The NSW Breeders Challenge eligibility conditions have changed over the years. Up to Series 3 sustainability was based on one payment, with the take up rate averaging 51%. It is evident that allowing owners to sustain per year has had an increase in the overall amount of horses that sustain. The percentage of horses sustained for the NSW Breeders Challenge from the past five Series has remained consistent.

There had been a continual decline in eligible horses for the NSW Breeders Challenge, however in Series 17 the number of eligible horses has increased. This may have resulted due to more Stallions domiciled in NSW.

These statistics are positive and are on the back of HRNSW's increased communication with stakeholders and the race series' and bonuses associated with the NSW Breeders Challenge.

Comment

Breeders Challenge Owners Bonus certificates are redeemable against the purchase price of a Breeders Challenge eligible yearling at any Australian Public Yearling Sale or against the service fees of stallions nominated for the NSW Breeding Schemes and associated breeding fees.

There is evidence that the Breeders Challenge Owners Bonus Certificates are a valued tool for breeders and yearling buyers. Minimal (5%) certificates issued have expired since 2014/15.


In recent times yearling purchases nearly consist of close to one quarter of redemptions. This is a result of current owners choosing to reinvest in a yearling rather than breed themselves. Nonetheless the proportion of certificates used for services to mares still remains high, which has helped to enhance the number of broodmares bred annually.

Nominators Bonus: The NSW Breeders Challenge Foal Nominators Bonus is a cash payment. The funds distributed cannot be tracked to confirm whether Foal Nominators reinvested the money back into breeding or to purchase yearlings at sales.

Comment

Majority of bonuses are still won as 2YO or 3YO horses making up 61% of all bonus winners. However bonuses won by 4YO and older horses has increased, now making up 39% of all bonus winners. The number of Owners Bonuses issued has continued to increase from the 2018/19 Season. It was noted an increase of Bonuses won with the addition of the National Rating System. However the number of bonuses issued in the 2020/21 season was impacted by the implementation of the racing season to a calendar year as the season ran for an additional 4 months (1/09/2020 - 31/12/2021) to allow for the change.

Comment

Since a historic low in both 2YO and 3YO horses racing, it is encouraging to see the amount of both age pools increase in recent seasons. This may be in no small part, due to the racing season beginning later than the breeding season allowing horses to mature before starting.

Comment

With the change to the Racing season, which no longer aligns to the breeding season, there has been a noticeable but not unsurprising increase to the number of starts for both 2YO and 3YO horses. There is also a noticeable increase in the number of 2YO horses starting with the extra time allowing these horses to mature. This plateaus for starters in the 3YO season, which has remained relatively stable for the past 5 years.

It is of concern that the number of age based races that have received sufficient nominations has decrease with the introduction of the National Rating (NR) system, with many 2 & 3YO horses targeting NR races rather than aged based races.

USA Imports are predominately Stallions and not race horses.

When considering the movement of horses between NSW, New Zealand and the USA, on average over the last fourteen (14) racing seasons there have been 204 imports into NSW and 53 exports out of NSW.

The number of imports into NSW from New Zealand had increased significantly between the 2010/11 which remained constant with over 200 horses being imported up until the 2015/16 racing season, however this number dropped to under 200 in the 2016/17 racing season and the trend has continued up until the 2019/20 season where the imports from NZ have started to increase again.

Due to dollar parity there was a stoppage of exports to the USA in 2010/11. Exports to the USA has been increasing over the past few seasons but it is evident there has been a peak in exports to the USA in the 2019/20 racing season. Though many factors could have contributed to this rise it must be noted that a large NSW Stable relocated to the USA which would have increased this number.

With the success of exported horses increasing and the Australian Dollar decreasing it is expected that the number of exported horses to the USA will continue to increase.
